with additional / new security features bearing signature of Dr.Y.V. Reddy, Governor

SALIENT FEATURES

Obverse (Front) Side

See through Register

The floral design printed both on the front (hollow) and back (filled up) in the middle of the vertical band next to the watermark window has the denominational numeral "10". Half the numeral is printed on the obverse and half on the reverse. Both the printed portions have an accurate back to back registration so that the numeral appears as one when viewed against light.

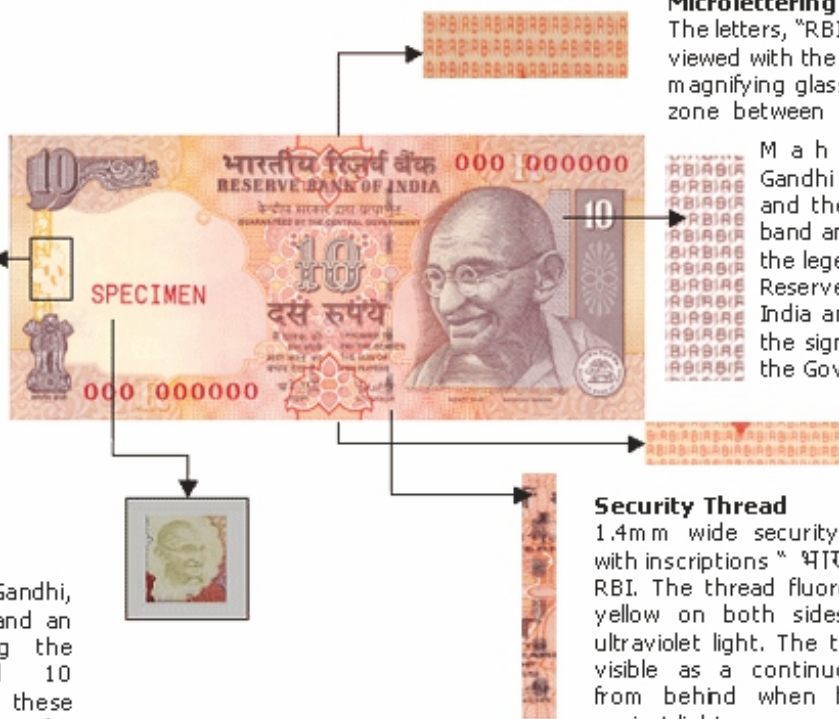
Watermark

The portrait of Mahatma Gandhi, the multi-directional lines and an electrolyte mark showing the denominational numeral 10 appear in this section and these can be viewed better when the banknote is held against light.

Microlettering

The letters, "RBI", can be viewed with the help of a magnifying glass in the zone between the

Mahatma Gandhi portrait and the vertical band and above the legend Reserve Bank of India and below the signature of the Governor.



Security Thread

1.4mm wide security thread with inscriptions " भारत " and RBI. The thread fluoresces in yellow on both sides under ultraviolet light. The thread is visible as a continuous line from behind when held up against light.

Reverse (Back) Side

Year of printing appears on the reverse of the banknote

Number panels of the banknote are printed in fluorescent ink. The banknote has optical fibres. Both can be seen when the banknote is viewed under ultraviolet light.

Paper

Identification Mark

A rectangle with improved intaglio print that helps the visually impaired to identify the denomination.

Watermark

The portrait of Mahatma Gandhi, the multi-directional lines and an electrolyte mark showing the denominational numeral 20 appear in this section and these can be viewed better when the banknote is held against light.

Intaglio Printing

The portrait of Mahatma Gandhi, the Reserve Bank seal, guarantee and promise clause, Ashoka Pillar emblem on the left, RBI Governor's signature on the banknote and the identification mark for the visually impaired persons are printed in intaglio, i. e., in raised prints, which can be felt by touch.

Latent Image

The vertical band contains latent image showing the numeral 20 when the banknote is held horizontally at eye level

Microlettering

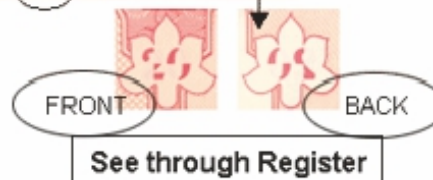
The letters, "RBI", and the numeral, "20" can be viewed with the help of a magnifying glass in the zone between the Mahatma Gandhi portrait and the vertical band.

Security Thread

1.4mm wide security thread with inscriptions "भारत" and RBI. The thread fluoresces in yellow on both sides under ultraviolet light. The thread is visible as a continuous line from behind when held up against light.

Intaglio Printing

Identification Mark

A triangle with improved intaglio print that helps the visually impaired to identify the denomination.

Watermark

The portrait of Mahatma Gandhi, the multi-directional lines and an electrolyte mark showing the denominational numeral 100 appear in this section and these can be viewed better when the banknote is held

Intaglio Printing

The portrait of Mahatma Gandhi, the Reserve Bank seal, guarantee and promise clause, Ashoka Pillar emblem on the left, RBI Governor's signature on the banknote and the identification mark for the visually impaired persons are printed in intaglio, i.e., in raised prints, which can be felt by touch.

Latent Image

The vertical band contains latent image showing the numeral 100 when the banknote is held horizontally at eye level.

Microlettering

The letters, "RBI", and the numeral, "100" can be viewed with the help of a magnifying glass in the zone between the Mahatma Gandhi portrait and the vertical band.

Security Thread

2 mm wide security thread with inscriptions "भारत" and "RBI" and exclusive colour shift from green to blue when viewed from different angles. It will fluoresce in yellow on the reverse and the text will fluoresce on the obverse under ultraviolet light. The thread is visible as a continuous line from behind when held up against light.

Reverse (Back) Side

Year of printing appears on the reverse of the banknote



Fluorescence

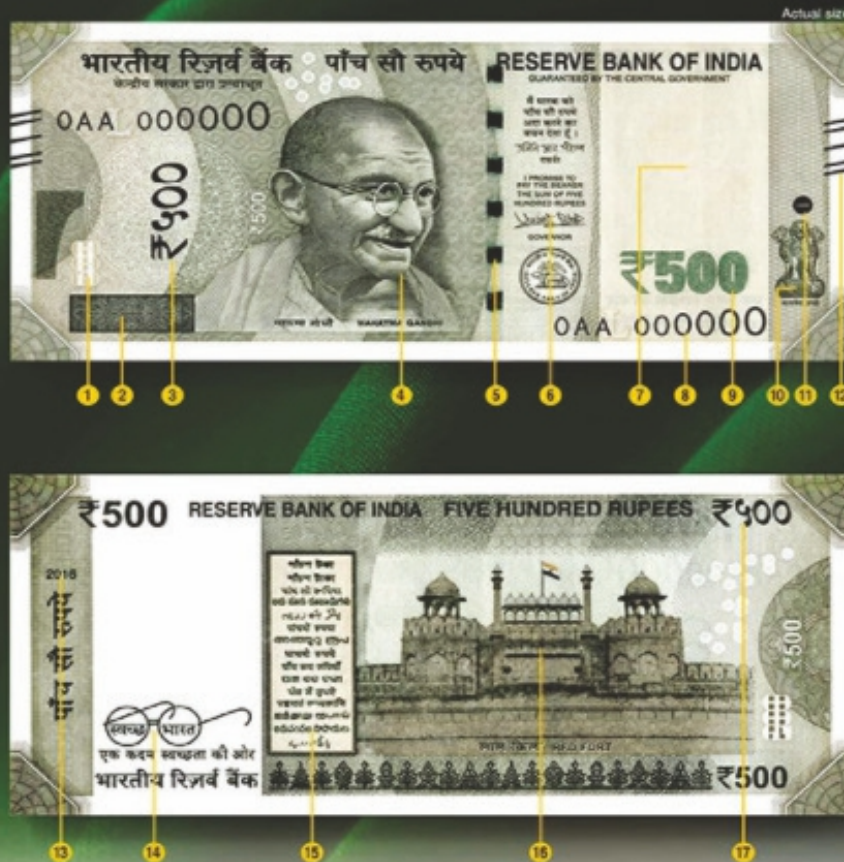
Number panels of the banknote are printed in fluorescent ink. The banknote has optical fibres. Both can be seen when the banknote is viewed under ultraviolet light.

Paper

Banknote is printed on a special watermarked paper with substrate cotton and cotton rag. This gives the banknote a unique "feel" and "cracking sound". The new series of Rs.100 banknote has paper with increased grammage and caliper thickness.



Now your bank notes in a new design RBI issues ₹500 notes in a new series



The new ₹500 notes in the Mahatma Gandhi (New) Series are different from the SBN (withdrawn series) in colour, size, theme, location of security features and design elements. The size of the new note is 66mm x 150mm. The colour of the notes is stone grey and the predominant new theme is Indian heritage site - Red Fort.

Features of the New ₹500 Notes:

Obverse:

- 1 See through register in denominational numeral
- 2 Latent image of the denominational numeral
- 3 Denominational numeral in Devnagari
- 4 Orientation and relative position of Mahatma Gandhi portrait changed
- 5 Windowed security thread changes colour from green to blue when note is tilted
- 6 Guarantee clause, Governor's signature with Promise Clause and RBI emblem shifted towards right
- 7 Portrait and electrotype watermark

- 8 Number panel with numerals growing from small to big on the top left side and bottom right side
- 9 Denomination in numerals with Rupee Symbol in colour changing ink (green to blue) on bottom right
- 10 Ashoka pillar emblem on the right

For visually impaired:

- Intaglio or raised printing of Mahatma Gandhi portrait, Ashoka pillar emblem, bleed lines and identification mark continue
- 11 Circle with ₹500 in raised print on the right
 - 12 5 bleed lines on left and right in raised print

Reverse:

- 13 Year of printing of the note on left
- 14 Swachh Bharat logo with slogan
- 15 Language panel towards centre
- 16 Red Fort – an image of Indian heritage site with Indian flag
- 17 Denominational numeral in Devnagari on right

Now your bank notes in a new design RBI issues ₹2000 note in a new series



The Reserve Bank of India is introducing new design banknotes in the denomination of ₹2000 as part of **Mahatma Gandhi (New) Series**. The new denomination has motif of the *Mangalyaan* on the reverse, depicting the country's first venture in interplanetary space. The base colour of the note is magenta. The note has other designs, geometric patterns aligning with the overall colour scheme, both on the obverse and the reverse. The size of the new note is 66mm x 166mm.

Features of the New ₹2000 Note:

Obverse:

- 1 See through register with denominational numeral 2000 can be seen when the note is held against light
- 2 Latent image with denominational numeral 2000 which can be seen when the banknote is held at 45 degree angle at the eye level
- 3 Denominational numeral 2000 in Devnagari
- 4 Portrait of Mahatma Gandhi in the centre
- 5 Micro letters 'RBI' and '2000'
- 6 Colour shift windowed security thread with inscriptions 'भारत', RBI and 2000. Colour of the thread changes from green to blue when the note is tilted
- 7 Guarantee Clause, Governor's signature with Promise Clause and RBI emblem towards right
- 8 Mahatma Gandhi portrait and electrotpe (2000) watermarks
- 9 Number panel with numerals growing from small to big on the top left side and bottom right side
- 10 Denominational numeral with Rupee Symbol, ₹2000 in colour changing ink (green to blue) on bottom right
- 11 Ashoka Pillar emblem on the right

For visually impaired:

- Intaglio or raised printing of Mahatma Gandhi portrait, Ashoka Pillar emblem, bleed lines and identification mark
- 12 Horizontal rectangle with ₹2000 in raised print on the right
- 13 Seven angular bleed lines on left and right side in raised print

Reverse:

- 14 Year of printing of the note
- 15 Swachh Bharat logo with slogan
- 16 Language panel towards the centre
- 17 Motif of *Mangalyaan* - reflecting country's first venture in the interplanetary space
